Our Vision

Oxford Presbyterian Church is a family of Christians dedicated to sharing the unconditional love of Jesus Christ with the local and world communities



“The question should not be “What would Jesus do?” but rather, more dangerously, “What would Jesus have me do?” The onus is not on Jesus but on us, for Jesus did not come to ask semi-divine human beings to do impossible things. He came to ask human beings to live up to their full humanity; he wants us to live in the full implication of our human gifts, and that is far more demanding.”

(The Scandalous Gospel of Jesus: What's So Good About the Good News?)

NOTE 1: Peter Gomes died a few weeks ago. He had served as Pastor to the Harvard University community for 35 years and was also Professor of Christian Morals at Harvard Divinity School. In my twenty years as a pastor, no interpreter of scripture has offered me more insight into God's Word; no preacher has given me more inspiration for my calling than Peter Gomes. Peter Gomes was gay.

NOTE 2: At the March meeting of Donegal Presbytery, the minister and elder commissioners voted by a narrow margin (83-80-1) to approve an amendment to the Book of Order (the PCUSA constitution for structure and ministry) that would allow presbyteries the option to examine and approve candidates for ordination even if they were open, practicing homosexuals. If this amendment is approved by 87 of the presbyteries it will be included in our constitution. The current tally is 74 presbyteries approving, 55 disapproving. To help you see the issue, here are the current and proposed new texts of the ordination standards:

CURRENT

PROPOSED

Those who are called to office in the church are to lead a life in obedience to Scripture and in conformity to the historic confessional standards of the church. Among these standards is the requirement to live either in fidelity within the covenant of marriage between a man and a woman, or chastity in singleness. Persons refusing to repent of any self-acknowledged practice which the confessions call sin shall not be ordained and/or installed as deacons, elders, or ministers of the Word and Sacrament.

Those who are called to ordained service in the church, by their assent to the constitutional questions for ordination and installation pledge themselves to live lives obedient to Jesus Christ the Head of the Church, striving to follow where he leads through the witness of the Scriptures, and to understand the Scriptures through the instruction of the Confessions. In so doing, they declare their fidelity to the standards of the Church. Each governing body charged with examination for ordination and/or installation establishes the candidate's sincere efforts to adhere to these standards.

You can see that the new wording eliminates the “fidelity and chastity” wording of the current text, which was inserted in 1997 to ban practicing homosexuals from ordination, either as Deacon, Elder, or Minister of Word and Sacrament. The new statement does not give blanket approval, but gives presbyteries (in the case of minister ordination) and sessions (in the case of elder and deacon ordination) the ability to assess each candidate. The theological discussion around this issue is both broad and deep and touches everything from scriptural authority to the nature of faith itself. Since its creation by merger of denominations in 1983 the PCUSA has been held in the grip of this issue, sometimes, it has seemed to me, to the exclusion of everything else of what it means to be the church.

Oxford Presbyterian Church is blessed in many ways. This congregation has a heart for a true variety of ministry in Christ's name, an openness to the needs of our community, and a deep respect for one another. We have a broad spectrum of diversity in general theological views, and in views on this issue. I have consciously attempted to keep issues of human-human relationships off of the “front burner” here, and to concentrate on our relationship with God, both individually and corporately. I hope that we have been able, thereby, to more fully dedicate ourselves and our congregation to “sharing the unconditional love of Jesus Christ with the local and world communities.”

NOTE 3: If this amendment does indeed pass 87 presbyteries and become part of our constitution, it will almost certainly lead to a significant exodus from the denomination by congregations and congregants who, despite pleas for unity and understanding, will not feel able to remain in the PCUSA. On the other hand, it could also usher in a new era of peace in our denomination and new opportunities to joyfully share the Gospel message.

I believe that we are enriched in the church by ministers like Peter Gomes, whose spirituality, wisdom and prophetic voice are gifts from God to the whole world. I do not believe that our sexual orientation and practice qualifies OR disqualifies any of us from serving the God we love, who saves all of us from our sins.

The Trouble (And Blessing) of Lent

from David Lose, Author, *Making Sense of Scripture*

Let's face it. Lent is in trouble....maybe it's the themes of Lent that trouble us. Penitence. Sacrifice. Contemplation. These are the words of Lent, and I, for one, have a hard time believing they were popular even with the Puritans (you remember, the folks that actually held competitions to see who could resist the greatest temptation or avoid the most pleasure) let alone now....

But you know what? Each year, whatever my feelings approaching Lent may be, the same answer comes whispering back: I do. Just maybe, I need Lent. Just maybe I need a time to focus, to get my mind off of my career, my social life, my next writing project – and a hundred other things to which I look for meaning – and center myself in Meaning itself....

Maybe I need the opportunity (and perhaps deep down I crave the chance!) to clear my eyes of the glaze of indifference and apathy which comes from situation after situation where I feel nearly helpless so that I can fasten my eyes once more on the almost unbearable revelation of the God who loves God's children enough to take the form of a man hanging on a tree.

And maybe, just maybe – and this takes the greatest amount of imagination of them all – just maybe Lent really isn't mine to do with whatever I please. Perhaps Lent isn't even the Church's to insist upon or discard at will. Maybe Lent isn't any of ours to scoff at or observe. Maybe Lent is God's. Maybe Lent is God's gift to a people starved for meaning, for courage, for comfort, for life.



CROP Walk 2010

Last year's walk is pretty much wrapped up, and all Oxford Area funds have been forwarded to Church World Services. 25% will be returned to the community to be used by the Neighborhood Services Center for the growing number of local food needs.

In 2010, \$12,611 was raised by Oxford businesses and the generous individual sponsors of over 100 individual walkers.

We especially want to thank walkers who raised over \$500: Don MacMillan of OPC, \$1750; Roger Bates of West Grove Methodist, \$1300; Jane Hershey of Oxford Methodist, \$535.

CROP Walk was originally started to raise awareness of hunger by having participants walk the distance most people in the world have to walk for food and water each day. Since 1980, CROP walk in Oxford has raised over \$306,000 to help stop hunger worldwide.

If it is, if we can imagine that Lent is not ours at all but is wholly God's, then maybe we'll also begin to recall, at first vaguely but then more strongly, that we, too, are not ours at all, but are wholly God's – God's own possession and treasure.

Seen this way, Lent reminds us of whose we are. The "sacrifices," the disciplines, these are not intended as good works offered by us to God; rather, they are God's gifts to us to remind us who we are, God's adopted daughters and sons, God's treasure, so priceless that God was willing to go to any length – or, more appropriately, to any depth – to tell us that we are loved, that we have value, that we have purpose.

Yes. I need Lent. I need an absence of gifts so that I might acknowledge the Gift. I need a time to be quiet and still, a time to crane my neck and lift my head, straining to hear again what was promised me at Baptism: "You are mine! I love you! I am with you!"

And so yes, I need Lent. And to tell you the truth, I suspect that you do, too. You see, if Lent is in trouble, it's only because we're in trouble, so busy trying to make or keep or save our lives that we fail to notice that God has already saved us and has already freed us to live with each other and for each other all the rest of our days. And so we have Lent, a gift of the church, the season during which God prepares us to behold God's own great sacrifice for us, with the hope and prayer that, come Good Friday and Easter, we may be immersed once again into God's mercy and perceive more fully God's great love for us and all the world and in this way find the peace and hope and freedom that we so often lack.


MISSION HIGHLIGHT

Neighborhood Services Center has been helping the community for 38 years by offering people with problems, questions or emergency needs a place to explore options and find answers; by providing space for county agencies and community programs to deliver services; and by establishing a link between people who want to reach out to help and the people who need help.

As part of **OPC's Mission** to the local community, the Outreach Ministry collects non-perishable food, cleaning supplies and personal care items in the basket by the door in the Narthex. Each week this is weighed and taken over to Neighborhood Services Center for the food pantry. NSC supplies food and personal care items to needy families and individuals in the community. Popular items that need to be replenished regularly are: paper products (paper towels, napkins, toilet paper), spaghetti sauce (especially with meat), canned or frozen meats, and items for children's snacks and lunches.

OPC also supports NSC through monetary contributions. We collect shoes, school supplies, socks, underwear, and toys. Our most ambitious project each year is hosting the Christmas Food Box Program in the Fellowship Hall.

The **Neighborhood Services Center Thrift Shop** offers resale quality clothing, furniture, and household items at 21 S. Third Street in Oxford. All proceeds from sales are used to fund existing NSC programs.

They also need volunteers to come to the warehouse and sew and those who would be willing to sew at home.

"Gain" which is Global Aid Network's logo has adopted this project for one year. They take mission trips to Haiti and teach sewing to the Haitian women. Anyone interested in going to Haiti with them is encouraged to contact them.

The Agency is a part of Humanitarian Aid through Campus Crusade for Christ located in Mount Joy, PA.

She said, “Today was a really bad day until the nurse told us ConKerr Cancer was in the Child Life Center waiting to sew with us.” My heart went out to this mom as I realized that the only smile she had received from her daughter that day was the result of a fabric choice and sewing a pillowcase. So that is our goal, to help as many children and their families have a reason to smile, if only for a moment while facing those “horrible days.”

What's Happening?

OPC Is Ready for Cardiac Emergencies: AED- Automated External Defibrillator

Sudden Cardiac Arrest (SCA) can happen to anyone, any time, anywhere, even in Church. OPC has provided two AEDs-Automated External Defibrillators for the protection of worshipers and the hundreds of other men, women, and children who use our church building during the week.

One unit is located on the second floor, in the parlor, mid-way on the post between windows on outside wall. The other one is located on the first floor, in the Fellowship Hall, on the left inside wall as you enter the door closest to the main rack of mailboxes. Please do a little "scavenger hunt" to visually locate each unit for your own benefit.

Our system is the ZOLL AED PLUS. It is very easy to use with voice instructions beginning as soon as it is opened. Each cabinet has separate pads for pediatric victims. The cabinets housing the AEDs are alarmed and will sound **LOUDLY** when the door is opened. The key to turn off alarm is inside the cabinet. Do Not Open these cabinets unless there is a real emergency with an unresponsive person.

**** A self-administered instructional DVD will be set-up in the Fellowship Hall, in the corner near the stage, for the first three Sundays in April. Please take 10-12 minutes to review the step-by-step instructions for using the

AED, especially if you have been certified in CPR. ****

We hope never to need to use the AED; but we will be ready! AEDs have in many cases significantly increased survival of Sudden Cardiac Arrest until emergency medical services respond to take over life saving procedures.
